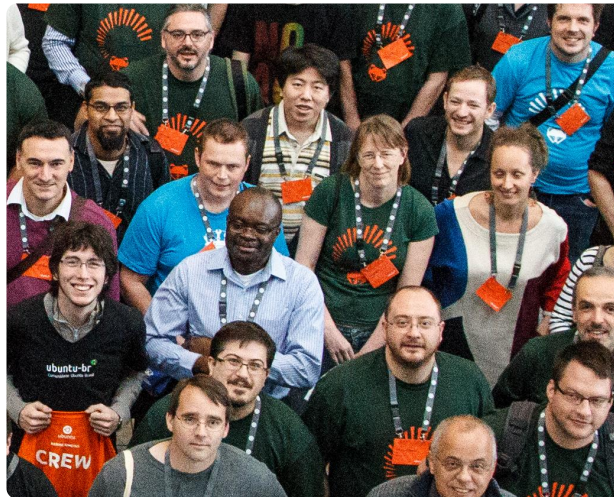
Xubuntu is a completely volunteer-driven project that depends upon talents from people such as yourself to contribute. No one is paid to work directly on Xubuntu.

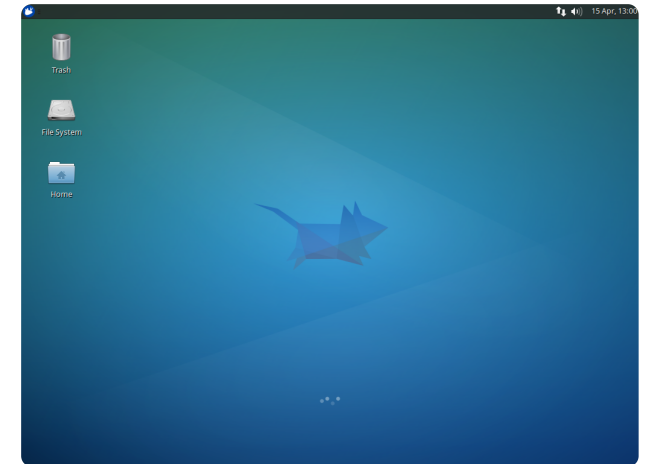

What can I do with Xubuntu?

Xubuntu comes preinstalled with applications for the most common tasks performed by a desktop system.

The applications and settings shipped by default are carefully selected, resulting in a seamless and stable system. Some of the default applications include:

Firefox® for web browsing, **Thunderbird®** for email and **Pidgin** for instant messaging.

LibreOffice Writer for word processing and **LibreOffice Calc** for spreadsheets.

Customizability is one of the strengths of Xubuntu. In addition to the deciding which applications to use, you can easily control many more aspects of the operating system and make it look and work as you like by using the **Settings Manager** shipped with Xubuntu. This flexibility also allows users to customize what services are loaded on startup and more so your session can be crafted to meet your requirements and make the most out of your hardware.

Finally, Xubuntu partners with a project to develop and maintain a clean, elegant theme that evolves with each release to give users a fresh, modern look that they have come to expect from today's operating systems.

In the Ubuntu ecosystem

Xubuntu is an officially recognized flavor of Ubuntu, featuring the Xfce Desktop Environment instead of Unity, and with a different selection of default applications and configuration. Xubuntu benefits from the broad hardware support in Ubuntu – most devices should "just work" when plugging them in.

The Xubuntu desktop covers both ends of the usability spectrum: the default settings are carefully selected to produce unified and simple experience for the novice while allowing a full range of customizations for the advanced user.

What is Xfce?

Xfce stands for "XForms Common Environment" and been polished by seventeen years of development. Xfce uses the Xfwm window manager, and has spawned several of its own projects, including: Xfce terminal (terminal emulator), Xfburn (CD and DVD burning program), Orage (calendar), Parole (media player) and Thunar (file manager).

Software in Xubuntu

Like Ubuntu, Xubuntu uses the **Software Center** to search for and install new software, such as new games, productivity tools, themes, fonts and other accessories to customize your experience. Software updates are automatically handled by the **Software Updater**.

What does the word Ubuntu mean?

The word Ubuntu is an ancient African term that can be roughly translated to "humanity towards others"



Programs from other desktop environments can be used with Xubuntu, it is designed to be flexible, and to allow the user choices.

However, bringing in programs from GNOME or KDE introduces dependencies, which can slow down the Xubuntu experience, which has become known for being stable and speedy.

While a lot of software is available from the Software Center, sometimes you might want to venture outside the usual. In this case, you can add more software sources, called repositories. Some software also offers downloadable ".deb" files for Ubuntu on their websites, these can almost always be used for Xubuntu too!

Based on Debian and Linux

Ubuntu is based on Debian, a free operating system started in 1993. In addition to Debian, the Linux kernel is an important part of the operating system.
